Beny sur Mer France.	6 Ju		TUESDAY: - Section 2 under Lieut J.L.Heaslip landed with C and D coy of N Shore R on Nan Red beach by St Aubin sur Mer at H / 20, 0805 hrs. The beach was under enemy small arms and mortar fire and the section sought protection by a sea wall and established a casualty nesting post there. The section stayed there until 1045 hrs rendering emers first aid and collecting wounded from the immediate beach area. The whole area was exposed to small arms andm mortar fire continually with the result that Pte Henderson, G and Pte Vermette, A.R. were killed by mortar shell on the beach and Cpl MacDonald, D.B. was severely wounded about the eyes and left arm. Pte Stewart, A.A. was very slightly wounded on the nose. The section left at 1045 hrs leaving Pte Marshall, L.S. behind as nursing orderly to the 60 or 75 wounded, and proceeded to sweep the town of St Aubin sur Mer for casualties which were nested at convenient places. The section then moved miles further south to vicinity of Toilleville and helped with evacuation of N Shore miles further south to vicinity of Toilleville and helped with evacuation of N. P. Tanton casualties. Lieut J.L.Heaslip went to Bernieres sur Mer and contacted Major G.P. Tanton at 2300 hrs 6 Jun 44. The section stayed by Toilleville until 1400 hrs 7 Jun 44 collecting and evacuating wounded and then rejoined the ADS at Beny sur Mer. Major A.D. MacPherson of 22 Cdn Fd Amb recce party was met on the beach at 0930 hrs also Major Chapman RAMC of FDS at the same time. A BDS was later extablished by the sea wall at	ency

TUESDAY (continued): - approximately 1200 hrs. Approximately 20 civilian casualties were treated in St Aubin sur Mer. Section 1 under Capt L.E.Cowan landed with C and D coy Q O R of C on Nan White beach by Bernieres sur Mer at H / 20, 0805 hrs 6 Jun 44. The section collected wounded on the beach which was under heavy enemy mortar and small arms fire. After an hour and a half, the section proceeded to Bermieres sur Mer and collected and nested casualties throughout the town. Capt L.E.Cowan took 13 surrounding German prisoners in the town. The section worked in Bernieres until about 1400 hrs and then proceeded, nesting casualties along the poute to Beny sur Mer which was reached at 1700 hrs. An improvised C.C.P. was set up there and about 25 casualties treated, which were evacuated by ADS ambulance at 0300 hrs D / 1, 7 Jun 44. This was the first contact made with HQ 22 Cdn Fd Amb. Capt L.E. Cowan, seriously ill with perforated peptic ulcer returned with same ambulance to FDS at Bernieres and was operated on. The section contunued treating casualties until 0900 hrs 7 Jun 44 when HQ arrived at-Beny sur Mer Section 5 under Capt I. Winkler assembled on beach at Bernieres sur Mer approximately H / 45 hrs with the Chaudieres group, commended picking up casualties and evacuating them to BDS working in small groups. Pte LeBar, D.L. was wounded when ICA in which he was landing hit a mine. Pte White, E.H. was wounded by a sniper bullet when rescuing a casualty from the water. The rest of section did a casualty sweep, nesting some and evacuating others to BDS at Bernieres. Section 5 proceeded south along road to Beny sur Mer, outskirts reached about 1960 hrs, worked during night in village and contacted HQ on their arrival at 0600 hrs D / 1 in Beny sur Mer. The recce party consisting of Major C.E. Baker, Major A.D. MacPherson (7 Cdn FDS) and Pte Etherington. F. T. landed in jeep at about 0900 hrs 6 Jun 44. Under heavy shell fire Major C.E. Baker and Pte Etherington, F. T. were wounded, with jeep a total loss. Major C. E. Baker became sererated and was last seen at 0930 hrs 6 Jun 44. Serial 1554 comprising 72 ORs and Major G.P. Tanton, H/Major J.M. Malone, Capt G. Scattergood, Capt J.W. Latimer, Capt R.D. Reid (CDC) from their LST sited land at about 1000 hrs. Capt J.W. Latimer was disembarked by rhind and proceeded to assembly area at about 1630 hrs. Remainder of party at about 2230 hrs. Contact with other part of Fd Amb was made and with 33/34 FDS. Part of the serial stand at the FDS area, the other part presented preceded them to assembly area. From serial 1555 At Col M.R.Caverhill disembarked by dukw at 1730 hrs. Due to confusion caused by smoke screen, part of the party with difficulty got to the assembly area, those remaining disembarked and made their way to the ADS at Beny sur Mer. A recce was done by Lt Col M.R. Caverhill and a site chosed at Beny sur Mer m.r. 988810 sheet 7E/5.

Dear Sir: - ...

I am sorry to be a bit late with my "recce" report. I'm afraid that this reconnaidance is taking me into a few odd and peculiar places. I am once again on my way back to England, dirty and unshaven, with a uniform dirties than it was in 1940.

There is also another difference in that there is no left sleeve in my shirt or battle dress blouse. If it wasn't for the splitt-ing headache I have from the bits of metal in my skull and the pain in my useless arm I would be comparatively happy.

A sitrep of Nam Red Beach as I saw it is a bit confusing.

I went across the channel in L.C.T. 707 with a splendid Canadian Officer
as skipper. He was Lieut C.J. Holland of St Thomas, Ontario. We hit Nan
Red Beach at 0855 hrs on D day. The beach was being shelled, mortored and sniped. The tide was high and we passed over the beach obstacles. A mine exploded on our right and damaged the craft slightly. As we were coming in there was a shop on fire away off to our left. Just before we went in, an L.C.I. on our left went down. The ships company waved good-bye as they slid under. Snipers bullets began richocheting in the craft. The skipper cursed the coxwain for staying on the prow but oddly enough it was the skipper who got killed. As soon as the door dropped the armoured bulldozer and john trailer left the craft. I left the craft next with Major
A.D.MacFherson and Pte Etherington, F.T. in my jeep ambulance. It was a
dry landing just as Lieut Holland had promised us. Shells were bursting all around us. We moved a few yards and then had to stop in a traffic jam of 3.P.Arty. The beach was sandy but unfortunately had a high wall behind it. The beach obstacles were of solid steel and each one had a teller mine tied on it. These were the new type mine and it was impossible to use a safety wire on them. I stepped on a mine but it did not go off. It was quite loose in the sand so I picked it up and threw it out to sea like a discus. There were several hundred men lying in the sand close to the wall. Some of them were wounded. Others were just sitting there waiting to get wounded apparently, because each shell burst picked off a few more. Major A.D. MacPherson and Major Chapman moved a few hundred yards to the west along the beach. Major Chapman's jeep was stopped by a groyne about three hundred yards west. I was very much amazed to see all these men sitting on the beach. I asked an R.E. officer why these men were not off the beach, he said that there was a belt of mines just moff the beach and that he couldn't go east or west because of snipers and mines. The snipers couldn't see the men against the wall. The snipers were shooting sailors in the cfaft and the craft were replying with A.A. guns. One German ran down to the beach and threw hand grenades into a craft. Someone killed the German with a sten gun. I gave morphia to men lying in the sand. I dressed a lot of N shore R wounded there. Most of the men did not have shovels so we put them to work digging holes in the soft sand with their hands. A shell exploded, blew off my hat so I decided to move a bit. I went about another fifty yards west and another explosion bent my glasses a bit and broke another mans back. About a hundred yards west along the beach there was a ditch through the barb wire into the mine field. This was just west of the sea wall. I think that this ditch was specially dug to be covered by rifle fire. I bent the wire back and are crawled part way through. I was going to toss a coin to see whether I got killed by a shell or a mine but a shell explosion behind me made up my mind for me. It landed me flat me flat on my face in the mine field. I rar along the ditch and was greeted by rifle that from the corner of a house off to the east about sixty yards. The shot missed me and I jumped into a bomb crater which happened to be in the edge of the ditch ky in a little hillock. The next about a transfer of the second of the s hillock. The next shot covered my face with dirt. I thanked God for those fortress bombs and wished that they had been bigger than one hundred pounds. It is amazing how small one can get if one really tries. After a few moments I heard a burst of sten gun fire. Someone else was firing at my sniper. I raised wink my pistol with my tin hat over my hand. Just as I reached the edge of the crafer, the shell dressing was shot off the back of my hat. I fired over the edge of the crafer. I heard a rifle bank on of my hat. I fired over the edge of the crater. I heard a rifle bang on the cobble stones and someone running away. Just then two beach riflemen a

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came along the ditch. The three of ran to the gate of the house and
the corner. We couldn't see anything but smoke. I posted the riflemen here as sentries and went back to the beach. I got Etherington and the jeep and
brought them up through the S.P. Arty to the ditch. I had no wire cutters
 so I coulen't get the jeep through the wire. For lack of a wire cutter we
 lost the jeep. Etherington and I crawled along the ditch. As we went along
  kicked up a mine. It was a dummy mine just two round pieces of tin with
  block of wood between them shaped like a teller mine. There was a sharp
steel'spike on top of the mine about three inches in length. I decided that
this was a durmy mine field and that it would be safe to bring the wounded
across. I went back to the beach. A mortar bomb blow part of a mans head
off and wounded me in the leg. Ehberington and I herded a few wounded up
the ditch. I remember particularly having a bad time getting a blinded N
Shore R soldier through the wire. Next time I go to wire I will take a wire
cutter with me. Mortar bombs were coming over six at a time. We got a few
men up the ditch between each serias of six hombs. Then I had four men carry-
ing a badly wounded man on a stretcher. A bomb hit the stretcher and killed
all the stretcher bearers and the patient. They were layed out just like a a cart wheel. I was standing to the right of number one and he stopped most of
the pieces coming my way. Two pieces hit me on the head and covered my face
and glasses with blood. One piece cut into the chest piece of my flak suite
and didn't hurt me so please tell the boys that flak suites are darn good
idea. I was stunned for a bit and did a bit of grovelling in the sand. Then
I ran up the ditch and hid in my bomb crater. A soldier hid in it with me
and he cleaned my glasses for me. After the next six bombs had gone over I
went back to the beach again like a darn fool. I was going to drive the jeep
off somewhere even if it was across a mine field. The jeep was surrounded by
S.P. arty and we couldn't move it. A single bomb came over and lit right be-
side me. It killed two men and knocked me down on my back. This time I got
three pieces in my left arm and a few more in my face. I crawled under the
jeep. A bomb set fire to the petrol on the S.P.arty. If the S.P. arty had
not been carrying so much petrol on the outside of their guns they would not
have lost four guns and burned up a lot of men. It was all started by a few
small mortar bombs. I couldn't use my arm by this time so I crawled into my
crater and stayed there. Bombs lit all around me but none of them touched me.
The S.P. arty was burning merrily by this time. The anmunition began explod-
ing. It was about twenty yards north of me and although many pieces went past
the top of my crater, none of them hit me. A sergeant crawled into my hole
with me. My arm was soaked in blood and was stinging a bit. He cut my sleeve
away, dressed my wound and gave me some morphine. The S.P. arty exploded and
covered the whole area with smore, fumes, burning cordite and retrol. The grass started burning all over the mine field and all around my hole. My
face was scorched a bit. The sergeant and I decided to make a run for the
house. Shells were exploding all over the place. A mortar bomb hit in the
ditch in front of us. It didn't explode. The sergeant grabbed me or I would
have stepped on it. We reached the house safely. The men who had been un-
lucky enough to stay on the beach under and around the S.P. arty were bur-
ned alive. Some of them were probably wounded previously by mortar fire and
could not move, but I cannot for the life of me understand why they all stay-
ed on the beach. As they burned up they screamed blood curdling screams that
 can hear yet. As the sergeant and Etherington and I made a run for it along
the ditch; the ammunition was going up continually. We ran around the dorner
   the house where I had posted the sentries. Quite a number of wounded had
gathered there so we sat down for a bit and hid from the flying steel. Fin-
ally we got everybody down into a big cement basement under the building. We cleaned up the basement and made a small hospital there. Pte Etherington
proved invaluable to me throughout the whole show. He is one of the coolest
and best medical orderlies that I have ever had. With S.P. arty exploding
all around him he salvaged the case of serum and dressings from the jeep.
The serum I think saved the soldiers life because he was practically dead when we gave it to him. Therrington and the gunner from the 19 Fd Regt did nearly all the dressings for me as I could only use one hand. The boys were
very much afraid of booby traps in the old house. A N Shore sergeant walked through a doorway and had his brains blown out nadaxxxxx ontox the floor
beside him. There was an old bed and a lot of junk in the basement which they were afraid to move. A couple of us with five or six holes in us decid-
ed that a few more holed wouldn't make much difference. We threw the junk out.
Nothing happened. We dressed everyone, laid them in rows, gave them morphine
etc. The ammunition explosions were dring down so Etheringson and I went to look for our jeep. All that was left of it was the two front tires and the
two petrol tins on the bumper. We salvaged the petrol and then hid while more
ammunition went up. As the ammunition kept exploding and the petrol was burn-
ing everywhere, we couldn't go back onto the beach via our ditch. I took two
 stretcher squads and we sneaked west along a hedge and then across the mine
```

eld in single file. Half way across a sniper shot at us. We hugged the ground for a few moments. Then there was a burst of sten gun fire which I deemed to be in the direction of the sniper. Finally we ran for it and hid behind a wall. The wall led down to the groyne on the beach where Major Chapman's jeep was stalled. It was on fire. We put the fire out and Etherington backed the jeep around the end of the groin. If you see Major Chapman, please tell him I am sorry I squashed his guitar. We gathered up all the wounded from amoung the S.P. arty. Most of the men there were dead including the engineer officer who had told me I couldn't get off the beach. Etherington put the fire out in a burning artillery jeep and backed it into the water away from the main fire. Then we went along the beach to the B.D.S. and reported the location of our patients. I sent Etherington back to the cellar and told him to wait for the A.D.S. to arrive. I dressed a few patients in the sand. The next thing I remember I was lying in the sand and a patient was trying to give me a drink. I reported to beach headquarters on Nan Red Beach that I was wounded and that I thought I should go to hospital. Just then an L.C.I. beached with some wounded aboard. I was sent aboard to see them. When I came out of the hole we going hell for leather for another L.C.I. that was sinking. We rescued everyone off that craft just just before it sank. There were several seriously injured cases. When I finished dressing them, we were alongside H.M.S. Waverly. The next thing I remember I was lying in the officers mess of H.M.S. Waverly talking to Commodore Ottway-Ribon. I was made very welcome by the officers aboard H.M.S. Waverly. I had several doses of morhpine and eventually fell asleep. I slept about twelve hours. Then I attended a burial service for Lieut Holland and Pte Shaw. Lieut Holland (the skipper of my craft) had lost both arms and part of his head in a mortar bomb explosion. About 1600 hrs 8 Jun 44 all wounded were transferred from H.M. S. Waverly to L.S.T. 406 bound for England. As we pulled away a cruiser was firing salvos at en enemy strong point. I was ashore between five and six hours. When I left there were about thirty five dead men on the shore and eighty or more wounded gathered up into a bunch at the house and another bunch near the groin on the beach. The Commandos had not cleaned out all the snipers west of St Aubin. The 8 Brigade had taken objective "Yew" but I did not get a chance to see Toilleville. As I came away there were beach craft on every beach to the west of us as far as I could see. I lost the jeep and all the equipment with her. I hope that loss did not bother you too much in the assault. If it is necessary I can send a statement to the Q.M. Capt Scattergood for the write off. I lost all my personal equipment and clothing and Etherington also lost his. When I get some clothing coupons I will get some clothes. I will make out a claim and send it to you for your signature As soon as my scratches are better I would like to come back to the unit, if that is satisfactory to you. It is the best place for me in the Army and I was quite happy there. If you will be so kind as to ask the ADMS to put in a special request to the R.U. for me I may find my way back to the unit one day.
